



Greater Manchester Clean Air Plan proposals

What it means for HGVs

Greater Manchester (GM) needs to take action to improve air quality, now and for future generations. Air pollution is linked to a range of very serious health conditions. It contributes to the equivalent of around 1,200 early deaths in GM every year, harming our health.

Government has directed GM to introduce a Category C Clean Air Zone across the region, to bring nitrogen dioxide (NO₂) levels on local roads within legal limits in “the shortest possible time” and by 2024 at the latest.

As air pollution does not respect geographic boundaries, all 10 local authority areas have worked together to develop a joint Clean Air Plan to improve air quality

You can now have your say on the key elements of the proposals, including the proposed Clean Air Zone daily charges, discounts and exemptions, and the proposed multi-million pound funding package to help impacted groups prepare.

A Greater Manchester Clean Air Zone

Government has directed GM to introduce a Clean Air Zone covering all 10 local authorities: Bolton, Bury, Manchester, Oldham, Rochdale, Salford, Stockport, Tameside, Trafford and Wigan. This would operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The purpose of a Clean Air Zone is to improve air quality by encouraging drivers to upgrade to a cleaner vehicle.

The impacts of COVID-19

The Government has asked GM to continue to progress the Clean Air Plan, and to continue with the consultation, based on proposals developed before the COVID-19 pandemic that showed compliance would be achieved by 2024.

GM is going to assess the possible impacts of COVID-19 on the Clean Air Plan and the consultation is asking questions about the impact of COVID-19.

This information will inform future decisions on each aspect of the final plan.

What is a 'category C' charging Clean Air Zone and is my vehicle affected?

Categories: Government has specified four categories of Clean Air Zones where drivers of non-compliant vehicles would pay a charge to travel within a designated area.

Ultra-low emission vehicles with a significant zero-emission range are exempt.

A category C Clean Air Zone means that non-compliant buses, coaches, hackney carriages, private hire vehicles, heavy goods vehicles and vans (including minibuses) would all have to pay a daily charge to travel into and within the Clean Air Zone.

You can check whether your vehicle is compliant, or would be liable to pay the daily charge, by using the vehicle checker on cleanairm.com/vehicle-checker

What does it mean if I have a non-compliant HGV?

Proposed daily charge

If your HGV is non-compliant Euro V or earlier engine (typically registered before 2013), you will be required to pay a **daily charge of £60** to drive within the Clean Air Zone.

Proposed discounts and exemptions

If you own a heavily specialised HGV, such as certain vehicles used in construction or vehicle recovery, under the proposals you will be eligible to apply for a permanent exemption, subject to state aid rules.



Proposed financial support for HGVs

In March 2020, Government awarded GM £8m towards the retrofit or replacement of non-compliant HGVs.

Subject to consultation, state aid restrictions and meeting eligibility criteria, owners of HGVs registered in Greater Manchester will be able to apply for a grant of up to £16,000 towards retrofit or a replacement grant of up to £5,500 per vehicle, dependent on vehicle size. Funding will be available to both commercial and private owners, or registered keepers.

HGV owners would also be eligible to access the proposed vehicle finance scheme.



A grant of up to £16,000 per vehicle towards retrofit to a compliant standard through a Clean Vehicle Retrofit Accreditation Scheme (CVRAS) certified system.

or

A grant of up to £5,500 per vehicle for replacement or vehicle finance contribution.

or

An average finance contribution of up to £5,500 with the finance contribution per vehicle capped at £8,800.

Limit of five vehicles per applicant.

What is the vehicle finance scheme?

GM is proposing a scheme to help eligible owners of a non-compliant vehicle gain access to vehicle finance. It has been designed to facilitate access to vehicle finance for a wider range of applicants than would ordinarily be the case and, where access to credit isn't normally an issue, the cost of the monthly finance will be more affordable.

It will use the Clean Air Funds to offer eligible owners the option to seek funding as either a lump sum grant or as a contribution towards vehicle financing, from a GM-appointed panel of finance providers to help them upgrade to a compliant vehicle.

Hardship Fund

GM is proposing a Hardship Fund of at least £10m to support individuals, companies and organisations who are assessed to be most economically vulnerable to the Clean Air Zone charge.

GM is currently considering the scope and scale of support required. The consultation asks questions about the impact of COVID-19 to inform the amount of hardship funding that needs to be made available.





Next steps

The consultation on the GM Clean Air Plan proposals run from **8 October to 3 December 2020**. You can have your say on the proposals by responding to the questionnaire available at cleanairgm.com
